Refugee Resettlement The Convention relating

to the Status of Refugees does not require any country to bring refugees to its shores.

Nevertheless, many do or accept a quota of UNHCR's referrals of refugees with particularly compelling needs for protection.

Traditionally, wealthy countries with strong immigration histories have accepted the largest numbers of refugees for resettlement. Recently, however, several developing countries have also begun accepting refugees for resettlement.

Below are listed the major resettlement countries in the order of the ratios of refugees they accept to their own populations.
